Workshops were wonderful; attended corrections sessions; keeping parents connected via family literacy and social services; leveraging community partners, microlearning, HSE bootcamps, ATB. 7.3 Plumas USD Program Update (S. Dutton)

- To date 22 graduates; ESL population dropping since January; Connections with FRC for counseling and warmer handoffs
- Raised question of the \$40K allocation between PCOE and FRC from April 30, 2020, FRAEC Board meeting, Item 4.6. D. Lerch reported that NOVA is showing a carryover for FRC from 2018-2019 because allocation was greater than what was received (but adjusted in 2019-2020). Formerly running consortium on a reimbursement basis, subsequently corrected to be in alignment with AB104. FRC doesn't need the \$40,387.00 so these funds can be reallocated from FRC to PCOE.
 - S. Dutton and D. Lerch to work with business offices to pinpoint actual funds received versus what NOVA shows.
 - D. Lerch to request an allocation amendment in NOVA to reflect the \$40K was never held by FRC but remained with PCOE. Subsequently, funds would be disbursed to members based on regional need. S. Dutton to provide D. Lerch with check numbers/dates/amounts. FRC will then clarify discrepancy.

Executive Summary

Executive Summary *

The Feather River Adult Education Consortium (FRAEC) is located in California’s Plumas National Forest, and covers mostly rural geography across Plumas and Sierra Counties. FRAEC consists of five Member districts: Feather River College, Plumas County Office of Education, Plumas Unified School District, Sierra County Office of Education, and Sierra-Plumas Joint Unified School District. The Alliance for Workforce Development (AWD) serves as the regional AJCC while NoRTEC serves as the regional Workforce Development Board providing services to the following counties: Butte, Del Norte, Lassen, Modoc, Nevada, Plumas, Shasta, Sierra, Siskiyou, Tehama, and Trinity. With such a vast area to cover, NoRTEC’s and AWD’s engagement with the FRAEC has been limited, but continues to improve.

During the 2025-2028 period, FRAEC will primarily address gaps in service and seamless transitions. Additionally, the Consortium will deploy methods to support accelerated learning programs for students in their academic pathways and/or career goals. The Consortium will work on building relationships with more community partners to leverage existing resources. To address the needs of rural areas, FRAEC will develop and implement a Distance Learning policy.

Based on the NoRTEC Regional Plan for 2025–2028, the demographic and labor market profiles of Plumas and Sierra Counties reveal notable trends and challenges within these rural regions of Northern California. Both counties are characterized by small populations, unique geographic settings, and an economic structure shaped by a limited number of key industries.

Demographic Overview

Plumas County experienced a modest population increase between 2018 and 2023, growing by approximately 301 residents. This growth was driven largely by an increase in residents aged 65 and older, who now represent a significant share of the local population. The county’s younger cohorts, particularly those aged 20–34 and 55–64, saw population declines, reflecting a regional pattern of outmigration among working-age adults. Notably, Plumas has the highest proportion of individuals with “some college” as their highest level of educational attainment, indicating a partially educated workforce that may benefit from upskilling initiatives.

Sierra County stands out as one of the few counties in the region projected to experience significant population growth over the next several years, with an expected increase of 9.4% by 2028. This growth is especially notable given the region-wide trend of population decline. Like Plumas, Sierra County also experienced gains in the 65+ age group, reinforcing concerns about a shrinking labor force and the need to attract younger, working-age residents to sustain economic activity.

Labor Market Characteristics

Plumas County recorded the highest unemployment rate in the NoRTEC region in 2023, at 7.3%, significantly above the regional average of 5.6%. This elevated rate signals structural labor market challenges and may reflect limited

employment opportunities, especially in high-growth or high-wage industries. Sierra County, despite its small size, posted a moderate increase in labor force participation and added 239 residents over the five-year period. However, like other rural counties, it still faces a low labor force participation rate compared to the statewide average.

Both counties are impacted by the broader trend across the NoRTEC region of labor force disengagement among prime working-age populations. The decline in younger cohorts (ages 20–34) and minimal growth in professional sectors exacerbate these concerns and suggest the need for targeted workforce development strategies that align with regional industry needs and educational attainment levels.

Industry and Occupational Trends

In both Plumas and Sierra Counties, the public sector and healthcare are dominant employers, consistent with the broader NoRTEC region. Government jobs make up a large portion of employment due to the counties' rural administration needs, while healthcare services are expanding to meet the demands of an aging population. Despite this, there remains a scarcity of jobs in high-growth sectors such as information technology and advanced manufacturing, limiting economic diversification.

The NoRTEC plan identifies Healthcare, Public Services, Construction, Hospitality, and Agriculture as priority sectors for growth and investment. These industries are expected to provide the bulk of new employment opportunities through 2028. For Plumas and Sierra, workforce strategies focused on healthcare support, behavioral health services, and rural nursing will be especially critical. Additionally, targeted training in construction and public infrastructure projects, particularly wildfire recovery and forest management, may yield immediate employment benefits.

The FRAEC Board recognizes that Adult Education plays a strategic role, and is a key component to, building community equity across the region we serve.

To prepare for drafting the Three-Year Plan, FRAEC Member Districts engaged in a series of activities:

- A. FRAEC Board Meetings: Monthly Board meetings focused on each Section of the Three-Year Plan and Guidance Memo. Discussions were held regarding needed updates to the previous Three-Year Plan and new objectives, activities, and outcomes were identified. The public and local partner agencies were welcome to attend all of these meetings and participate in discussions.
- B. North/Far North PLC: Regular meetings were held with the ten (10) CAEP Consortium Directors in the North/Far North Region where the NoRTEC Workforce Development Board operates. Included in the discussions were reviews of CAEP Three-Year Planning guidance, templates, and labor market information.
- C. CCAE North/Far North: This year, for the first time, OTAN and CCAE sponsored a regional conference held in the north. This allowed for data to be shared, relationships to be built, and networks developed.

Evaluate the Educational Needs of Adults in the Region *

To assess the needs of the region, the FRAEC Board undertook a series of activities to better understand the needs, customers, and demographics of the communities served by the Consortium.

A. Three-Year Planning Self-Assessment Tool

The CAEP Three-Year Planning Self-Assessment Tool was used by the FRAEC Board as a means of better understanding the current strengths and opportunities of the Consortium. The tool was used as a launch point of discussion, and resulted in a consensus outcome. The Consortium Board found that the tool helped to shine light on areas where improvement could be found. Compared to the previous scores, this represents significant achievements in program improvement over the past three-year implementation period for the Consortium.

B. Monthly Board Meetings Focused on Three-Year Plan Sections Facilitated Steering Committee

Between October 2024 and March 2025, the FRAEC Board spent time at each monthly Board meeting to discuss the Three-Year Plan. The meetings yielded information about the goals of each Member District, and the areas of focus for the coming 12-month period and beyond.
